



Editor's Thoughts

Forgotten Hero: The Rise and Fall of KarTrak, the First Barcode System

In a world dominated by black and white stripes, a forgotten hero lies in the shadows. KarTrak, the first-ever barcode system, paved the way for the technology we use today in supermarkets, libraries, and countless other applications.

Developed in the late 1960s by the Slovenian Railways and later adopted in North America, KarTrak wasn't your typical barcode. Instead of the familiar stripes, it relied on horizontally arranged colored bars applied to the sides of railroad cars. These bars, read by optical scanners positioned along the tracks, automatically identified each car and its contents, revolutionizing the railroad industry.

Before KarTrak, identifying and tracking railroad cars was a tedious and error-prone manual process. Workers had to physically read and record car identification numbers, often leading to mistakes and delays. KarTrak offered a much-needed solution, streamlining the process and increasing efficiency.

Despite its groundbreaking nature, KarTrak faced some limitations. The colored bars were susceptible to weather conditions, particularly rain and snow, which could hinder their readability. Additionally, the cost of implementing the system was a significant hurdle for some railroad companies.

By the late 1970s, KarTrak was phased out in favor of more advanced and weatherproof technologies. However, its impact on the world of barcodes cannot be overstated. KarTrak laid the foundation for the development of the modern barcode systems we use today, proving the concept and paving the way for a future filled with efficient and automated identification solutions.

While its reign may have been short-lived, KarTrak serves as a reminder of the ingenuity and innovation that can sometimes be overshadowed by later advancements. It reminds us that even seemingly simple solutions can have a profound impact on our world and pave the way for the technologies we rely on today.

While KarTrak was the first attempt at automated railcar identification, it wasn't directly replaced by a single specific technology. Instead, its shortcomings led to the exploration and implementation of several different solutions:

 Radio Frequency Identification (RFID): This became the dominant technology for automatic railcar identification. RFID tags attached to the cars transmit a unique signal when they pass by readers installed along the tracks, offering greater reliability and all-weather functionality compared to KarTrak.

- Optical Character Recognition (OCR): This technology utilizes cameras to capture and read existing
 alphanumeric identification numbers painted on the sides of railcars. While not as efficient as RFID, it
 offered a more affordable alternative for some applications.
- Automatic Train Identification (ATI): This system relies on transponders installed on locomotives, which transmit information about the entire train composition, including individual car identification, to trackside readers. This provides a broader picture beyond just individual car identification.

These advancements, along with ongoing developments in areas like satellite tracking and wireless communication, have collectively addressed the limitations of KarTrak and continue to improve the efficiency and accuracy of railcar identification in the modern era.


Drawing Prizes Preview

Switchers & TrackMobile's

How do industries move cars around their yards for loading and unloading??

For a small company that gets 1 car delivered per week, the railroad could simply spot the car where it is needed. This would be areas such as a loading dock or perhaps even under a hoist or crane. But what about companies that get a half dozen cars delivered per week and need to move them around for loading and unloading?

Part of this decision on how to move railcars also depended upon the size of the company. Some companies moved cars by hand or even with tractors and trucks. Although this probably wasn't the safest method.





As the need for safer and more reliable ways to move rail cars continued, many different switchers were developed and used. Below are a few examples.

These locomotives were good for dealing with cars on the outside of a factory, but what about inside? How about companies that needed to roll the car inside to unload its contents out of the weather.

In 1948 an ex-Navy pilot named Marshall Hartelius was working for the Whiting Corporation and was assigned the task of finding a way to better move cars inside a factory. A traditional locomotive needed constant service and maintenance not to mention would constantly get "stuck" on dead

tracks behind cars and then would no longer be efficient. A solution was needed that could allow a small railcar mover to lift off the tracks and relocate to another track.

As Marshall worked on the problem it was quickly apparent that the weight of the rail car mover would need to be sufficient to push or pull the rail car but light enough to be able to move on wheels around the factory without tearing up the floor or roadways. After giving this some thought he came up with the idea of using the railcars weight for traction. Once the rail car mover was in place, the coupler would lift and slightly lift the railcar, thus using all its weight for traction on the rails. The idea worked, and the TrackMobile was born. By 1950 the Whiting Corporation decided that other companies could benefit from this, and so Marshall was sent around the country on a sales tour. Today over 11,000 TrackMobiles are in operation in more than 60 countries.

West Coast Railways has suspended its world-famous Jacobite steam train with immediate effect. The service has run for **30 years**, but with the ongoing exemption suspension, the decision has been taken to suspend the service. The train runs from Fort William to Mallaig and WCRC says it brings in an estimated £20m to the tourism sector.

WCRC has <u>submitted an application for a temporary exemption</u> from March 2024, however, as the exemption has not yet been granted, WCR has had to suspend the service until further notice.

Alaska Railroad Selling off the Crown Jewels?

Alaska Railroad is the only state-owned full-service railroad in America and the only one offering passenger service. This goes back to World War II when the Federal government created it and then turned it over to Alaska after the war.

Currently, Brightline is the only real private passenger line in America.

Now a bill has been introduced in the Alaska state legislature to privatize the Alaska railroad.

Privatizing anything usually results in the elimination of "less profitable service."

High-end passenger cars (comparable to what the Rocky Mountaineer offers in Canada and Colorado and Utah) are privately owned, some by the cruise lines. Typically, they are at the end of regular Alaska Railroad passenger trains.



Treasurers Report


The business meeting was adjourned at 9:11.

Brightline/Virgin Trains USA




