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Editor's Thoughts

The history of dioramas can be traced back to the 19th century. The term "diorama" was coined by Louis Daguerre and Charles Marie Bouton, who created a theatrical experience in Paris in 1822. This early form of diorama involved large, painted canvases illuminated in different ways to create the illusion of depth and movement.

While these early dioramas were impressive, they were not the dioramas we are familiar with today. Over the years, diorama techniques have evolved. Modern dioramas often combine traditional approaches, such as painting and sculpting, with more advanced technologies, including digital imaging and 3D printing. These advancements allow for greater realism and detail in the creation of dioramas.

Dioramas remain popular today as educational tools, artistic expressions, and historical representations. They can be found in museums, zoos, and other cultural institutions worldwide, and they are a crucial component of model railroading. Dioramas serve several key purposes:

- Allowing model railroaders to create detailed and realistic scenery, including landscapes, towns, and industrial areas. This adds depth and dimension to the layout, making it more visually appealing and immersive. Incorporating lighting and sound effects to enhance the scene's atmosphere, creating a more engaging experience for viewers.
- Dioramas can be used to create scenes or stories within the larger model railroad layout. For example, a diorama might depict a bustling train station, a quiet countryside scene, or a historic event. Isolating a particular scene, dioramas allow model railroaders to showcase intricate details and craftsmanship that might be overlooked in a larger layout.

- Dioramas provide a controlled environment for photography, allowing model railroaders to experiment with different angles, lighting, and compositions. Dioramas can help create professional-quality photographs that capture the beauty and realism of the model railroad.


- NO end numbers.

Atlas HO-scale sectional track, in original packaging.

- 6 code 83 nickel silver 9-inch straight sections.
- 6 code 83 nickel silver 18-inch radius curved sections.



Atlas HO-scale snap-track turnouts in original packaging with controllers, wire and screws.

- One brass left-hand code 100 (0.100" rail height) turnout.
- One nickel silver right-hand code 83 (0.083" rail height) turnout.



February Wavy Rails By Joe Costa Public Service Announcement: Stay off the Tracks --- Don't End up like Ooey Gooey



Tower Arrived for Second "Rescue" Church



His tower is three inches shorter than the other and will not need any trimming. I will add a light through an existing hole in the base. The tower base is slightly smaller than the round hole in the church base, so I will need to slip a square in between. Spray paint will hide the seams even better after I give it a second coat. Like the other church, there will be a door behind the arch and a garden up front.

Once you start looking, it's incredible how many towers are out there, whether kits or preassembled. Dice towers for games are in the lead, as are some kits and files for lasers or 3D printing. Others I have seen are business card dispensers or wine bottle carriers.



Dice Towers Gone Wild



The top view of this tower is very similar to the LASER SVG kit I ordered, though the catch area on the base is different.

All these castle-like towers need to have roofs for layout use. Some towers with stairs often have flat or removable raised roofs.

Typically, they lack roofs and sometimes have stairs, which help randomize the falling dice. I have laser files for the round tower. Dimensions vary between models. The Aztec one was at the Boutique Mall and was on the big side.



Tiniest Tower & Aztec Pyramid (Cool but a little too Exotic)



This tower is so tiny that a multisided dice barely has room to fall through it.

One option would be to have a wild amusement park layout, like Universal Studios, circled by a model train, like the Hogwarts train, passing through Jurassic Park and Medieval Land. Aztec/Alien Land might be too scary for little kids. Back in 1995, Alien Encounter opened in Magic Kingdom, but it was so scary that they shut it down.



Removable Roof & Courtyard: Water Tower or Lighthouse?

Civic Building, Castle or Cathedral

In an emerging American Republic whose early citizens had to define the national character from scratch, the stately building style, borrowed from classical times, became a perfect mode of

expression. This building style would make more sense in Chicago than Colorado Springs. A cathedral is shown (in non-dice tower mode) --- adding a roof to the high tower and covering the courtyard would help. Some have removable roofs.



New Integrated Crossover in Colorado Springs Yard

With a one-piece crossover replacement, the parallel tracks are even closer, and the crossover is even shorter. This way, the yard tracks have uniform spacing, and there is a wider and longer passenger platform. I will cut and install black foam to extend the road crossing across all seven tracks. The Santa Fe-style station above will be replaced first by the Lionel station and ultimately by the Harvey House station.

The kit came from the FUNDIMENSIONS Division of General Mills Fun Group. It also looks like the Hornby R199 Mainline Station which also looks like a Pola station. What a coincidence.



I should be able to remove the central tower, shorten the building's height, and eliminate most of the gables.

This is reminiscent of the Colorado Springs Harvey House. I have the kit and will assemble it alongside the Colorado Springs Yard (without the central tower). But it has way too many gables.

I should be able to remove the central tower, shortening the building. It is not as deep as the original Harvey House, but that is no problem in my book. Replacing the entire second story and roof is an option.

Similar Disney Main Street Station

Except for the huge central tower, this model looks more like the original Colorado Springs station, especially with two arched wings. I do not have this model. \$300 is a typical price on eBay.

Current Catalyst Building --- the Ultimate Goal

The arches remind me of the Castaneda in Las Vegas, New Mexico. The predominant architectural element in the Harvey House was the arches around the building. The side arched areas were enclosed, which is the ultimate goal of the layout.



Layout aligned with Navy Pier & Lighthouse

I always planned to have the Navy Pier with a Ferris wheel in this location on a removable base. The lake area is 4 feet wide and deep at this end. The remaining 8 feet of length, the access corridor is three feet wide. The layout along the wall is only about 18" deep --- enough space for the two elevated tracks and the mainline below. The image below has been cleaned up. The Navy Pier points to the lighthouse out at the breakwater. The final scene will end up being compressed. I will add the Ferris wheel. Build Your Own Chicago has a postcard-sized paper model. Kibri has an n-scale model that looks quite like the original, except for the paint job.

Kidz Crossing at TECO Show

If you happened to read my articles in the Dec. 2024 Milepost or in the Jan 2025 Milepost, you're probably starting to notice an underlying theme developing. The theme is that we need to continue getting the younger generation interested and excited about trains. In the December article, I talked a little bit about how we need kids to be able to touch and play with the trains and not just watch from a distance. With that as our goal, Amber and I have been hard at work collecting new trains that we are ready to share with the kids who come to the TECO shows.

I have always focused my train collection efforts on HO scale. However, over the past few months, I have a small railroad in G-Scale trains for kids to operate. We will have a 3-car Colorado & Southern passenger train at the show and a mixed freight Denver & Rio Grande Western train. We will alternate which trains are running and possibly even allow some switching. We have a few extra freight cars, so we will have a few sidings where the cars can be set out or picked up. We also have a G-Scale Eggliner. If you don't know what that is, you'll want to stop by and check it out. It is a super cute little egg-shaped car that is decorated in a "police" theme. So, we'll have kids operating it and possibly picking up a hobo or something along the way.



To make this easy for kids to operate, I have created a control stand that will hold the power pack and have a few switches to control the power to the sidings. It was a half-day project in my garage that was a lot of fun to build. Along with the little control stand, I also built, and Amber painted, some stanchions to keep the kids and public from walking into the trains since they will be set on the ground.




Once the kids have had a turn operating the G-Scale trains, we give them stickers that say, "I drove a train, Kids Crossing Engineer."

For the younger kiddos, we will have a couple of cityscape play mats with roads and towns on them on the floor. On top of the mats, we have wooden magnetic trains that can build tracks, bridges, tunnels, a roundhouse, and more.



Finally, we will set up a table with several different train coloring pages for all ages. We will have crayons and colored pencils for them to use. Hopefully, we will continue to encourage kids to enjoy trains, and we may even grab the attention of their fathers and grandfathers, who have forgotten how much fun they had playing with trains.

Show and Tell: Anything Goes and Free Form By Tony Pawlicki

This note outlines the rules for the Show And Tell session/contest at the MARCH 2025 Pikes Peak Division NMRA meeting. Rules apply to the (typically) bi-monthly "*salvage and resurrection*" events. The event (sort of a second, less formal contest) was inspired by our late beloved Division Superintendent's notion in his March 2023 Milepost Conductor's Corner column.

This event is being announced a bit over two months in advance (in the MILEPOST just before the February meeting) to give folks enough time to prepare their entries. For March, the salvage and resurrection topic are ANYTHING AT ALL, continuing our effort to get more participation.

Starting with the June 2024 meeting, we now have two parts to the event:

- The *theme-specific* contest/presentation (for March, it is ANYTHING AT ALL).
- NEW FEATURE: Free form *show-and-tell*, on any topic you choose. This feature is being added by popular request folks have suggested this to our Superintendent.

GENERAL IDEA for the theme-specific part (ANYTHING AT ALL this month):

- Grab an old, failed project you couldn't bring yourself to discard (or a disaster picked up at a train show or store).
- *Plan a fix* (turning it into something good, though not necessarily creating what you originally planned), then *actually fix* it.
- Bring it, display it, and then stand up after the regular model contest and tell us about your adventures.
- **The show-and-tell aspect is the main thing**. Given enough entries (3), there'll be a contest aspect, too, but the main goals are having fun salvaging something and entertaining the rest of us with the way you had fun.

THIS SESSION'S THEME: ANYTHING AT ALL, to encourage broader participation.

EXAMPLES:

- An example and the rules were provided in April 2023 Milepost.
- To remind us that the salvage and resurrection project need not be a huge effort, *the January 2025 Milepost provided an example* (SALVAGING INTERNATIONAL HOBBY CORPORATION (IHC) DTI 10175) where just one major change was needed to "save" the model.
- This was also an example of **a model that needed saving right out of the box.** A model doesn't always need saving just due to having lived a rough life post-purchase.

The Lighter Rail

Coffee with a Side of Train Car

Jesse Fox, owner of Train Cars Coffee & Kava, may have Colorado's most unique coffee shop. Three historic train cars make up his coffee shop in Nederland, CO.

In an article in the Gazette Telegraph's Life section on Friday, December 13, 2024, written by Seth Boster with photos by Christian Murdoch, Jesse goes on to add that he had seen these train cars in different conditions over the years and that he realized the more you put into them, the more they give back.

Although Train Cars Coffee & Kava was registered in 2022, the three cars that make up the coffee shop have been around Nederland since the 1970s and are over 100 years old. The caboose car was built in 1910 for the Colorado and Southern Railroad. Its original number was 242. It had eight sleeping bunks for the train's workers, a stove, a coal box, lockers, a desk, and a cooler. It is one of the last cabooses to feature an all-wooden curved ceiling, as later cabooses had flat ceilings. In 1965, it was a victim of the South Platte River flooding, which submerged much of Littleton and Denver, Colorado. Retired from service shortly thereafter, it was taken to the town of Wall Street, Colorado, now a ghost town in Boulder County but once home to the Wall Street Gold Extraction Company. It was later moved to Nederland.

Train Cars Coffee and Kava's website tells the history of the Ollman Pullman car. "It was built for the Colorado and Southern Railroad in 1906 and ran exclusively in the region as car number 544 until its retirement. It was one of the last plush wooden coaches and served as a dining car. Although it started with a wooden undercarriage, it was outfitted with steel in 1922. Its last official ride was the Denver to Louisville route in 1970 when it was retired. The car sat near Highway 36 as part of a larger property for a while and was moved to Nederland in 1975."

The website also tells the story of The Sells-Floto Circus Car. It was initially a railway post office car circa 1872 used by the Union Pacific Railroad. It traveled on the Union Pacific, Denver, and Gulf Railroad. It is one of the oldest standard gauge cars and was never reconfigured with steel. Sells-Floto acquired the car to replace a car accidentally burnt during repainting. The car then became an advance-advertising car for the circus. It would arrive in towns a few days before the circus, covered with signs promoting Sells-Floto. A narrative written by Pam North tells the story of Jimmy Keith and the car on a plaque near the car. Jimmy, whose family had built railroad cars in the railroad's heyday, found and purchased the Circus Car in Wiggins, Morgan County, Colorado. Much of the original painting on the car's exterior is still intact. Before joining the Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey Circus, the Sells-Floto circus hosted Buffalo Bill's "Wild West Show". The car has original mahogany walls, wallpaper ceilings, and stained-glass windows. The car dates to 1906 and served as a dining car. The plaque outside the car states that "it was one of the last plush wooden coaches." Fox comments in the article, "If you were riding in a Pullman dining car, you had money at that time in history."

From the coffee shop's website: Frederick Bonfils and Harry Tammen, who also owned the Denver Post, owned the Sells-Floto Circus. The name "Floto" came from Otto Floto, who was a sports editor for the Post and whose name inspired Harry Tammen. During 1914 and 1915, the Circus starred "Buffalo" Bill Cody as its main attraction, performing the "re-creations" of the Old West for which he had become so famous. Later stars of the Sells-Floto Circus included Tom Mix and Tony the Wonder Horse. The circus became a part of a group of traveling road shows purchased by the Ringling Brothers group in 1929.

If seeing the unique coffee shop is not enough, the extensive menu of coffee, tea, kava, mini doughnuts, and sandwiches leaves mouths watering. The coffee shop has "world famous" fried mini doughnuts. They are topped with the "works," powdered sugar, chocolate, caramel, whipped cream, and sprinkles.
