

Editor's Thoughts

If you haven't realized it yet, I'm a techy nut! After examining DIY DCC systems for some time this month, I've decided to tackle DCC-EX.

DCC-EX is an open-source software system designed to control model railroads using a Digital Command Control (DCC) protocol. It allows hobbyists to build their command stations using readily available Arduino boards and other electronic components. Here's a breakdown of its key features:

- The software is freely available and allows for customization and modification based on individual needs.
- Instead of using expensive commercial DCC command stations, DCC-EX empowers users to create their own using Arduino boards and other hardware components, making it a more cost-effective solution
- It supports most of the NMRA DCC standards, enabling control of locomotives, accessories, and other DCC-equipped elements on your model railroad layout.
- Key functionalities include:
 - Control of multiple locomotives simultaneously.
 - Activation of various function buttons (F0-F28 and F29-F68) on locomotives for sound, lights, and other features.
 - Control of accessory decoders for operating turnouts, signals, and other layout elements.
 - Programming functionality for configuring locomotives and accessories (both on the main track and a dedicated programming track).
- While it involves building your hardware, DCC-EX is known for being user-friendly with readily available
 documentation and resources. There are online communities and tutorials to help users get started
 and troubleshoot any issues.
- It works with various third-party hardware components like motor shields, WiFi shields, and software applications like JMRI, Engine Driver, wiThrottle, and Rocrail, offering flexibility in building your control system.

Overall, DCC-EX is popular for model railroad enthusiasts who want a cost-effective and customizable DCC control system for their layouts. It offers a good balance between affordability, functionality, and DIY spirit.

Show and Tell: Boxcars and New Free-form

This note lays out the rules for the bi-monthly Show And Tell session/contest at the JUNE 2024 Pikes Peak Division NMRA meeting. These rules apply to the bi-monthly "salvage and resurrection" events. This event was originally announced a bit over a month in advance to give entrants enough time to prepare their entries. The event (sort of a second contest) was inspired by our late beloved Division Superintendent's notion in his March 2023 Milepost Conductor's Corner column.

New Feature: Starting with this (June) meeting, we have two parts to the event:

- The theme-specific contest/presentation (this month it is boxcars).
- New Feature: *Free-form show-and-tell*, on any topic you choose. This feature is being added by popular request -folks have been suggesting this to our Superintendent.

You have had five weeks to get ready, so I'm hoping for a big turnout!

General Idea for the theme-specific part (boxcars this month):

- Grab an old, failed project you couldn't bring yourself to discard (or a disaster picked up at a train show or store).
- Plan a fix (turning it into something good, though not necessarily creating what you originally planned), then actually fix it.
- Bring it, display it, then after regular model contest, stand up and tell us about your adventures.
- The show-and-tell aspect is the main thing. If there are enough entries (three), there will be a contest aspect as well, but the main goal is to have fun salvaging something and entertaining the rest of us with the way you had fun.

Example: An example and the rules were provided in the April 2023 Milepost.

This Session's Theme: Boxcars:

- old ones and new ones (both as regards construction and as regards markings)
- sizes: long or short, Plate B or excess height
- side doors: plug, sliding, plug-and-sliding ("combination door"), roll-up (yes, there were a few, though they never became popular); 1, 2, or 4 doors to a side
- end doors: large (for autoloading), small (for "stick" lumber loading in the old days when labor was cheap)
- roof walks or not
- high or short-end ladders and brake wheels
- body-mounted or truck-mounted brake cylinders
- others I've not thought of.

Not so Secret Rancho de Taos Module Update

I have been working on a module that is a fusion of Rancho de Taos and Taos based on an alternate reality where the Denver and Rio Grande actually went to Taos. The buildings are from laser kits. One exception is the Rancho de Taos church which started off as a 3D structure. Once brought in to a meeting for show and tell. It is being modified to have a removable roof and lighted interior. Other buildings were kits and some freelanced or modified.

Here are some 3D printed pews and other furniture that may be added under the removable roof. I ordered two sets with a total of four short and four long benches mounted on a removable floor. I suspect I will cut the long benches in half, paint them and mount mirrors on the side walls to enhance the view.







Missing in Action Church with Next of Kin

This church is an internet "orphan" by Sarissa. It was supposed to be 28mm scale and released several years ago. Except for the missing tower, I ordered this 1/72 scale church from eBay which is identical. It has the "Fisherman" brand. Assenbled, waiting for Spanish tile roof and façade and painting.

The tower just seems oversized and uninspiring compared to the original. But I have found and ordered a substitute.





Some Disassembly & Reassembly was Required (OOPS)





After assembling the church but before painting or adding the Spanish tile, I noticed a picture on the website that the church doors open inward and the hinge piece is INSIDE the church. I needed to take off the roof to paint and install the doors. I HATE when that happens. The floor provides needed stability to the kit.

I may also slip some LED strips into the church.

Size wise, it is definitely a more impressive building.

By accident, I double ordered the Fisherman kit and made a longer more realistic looking church. Painting, roof tiling and adding a cross on top comes next followed by the white accent trim upfront. I have no plans to add the tower or build another church with a tower.

The Two Lengthened Churches for the Module:





The original kit had only three windows. We replaced and lengthened the sides to have five windows. Still, it is a small building, and the front was plain jane. It needs a little more work. I used the extra Fisherman front to update the entrance of original Sarissa church. I need to install a bell.

Those containers got pretty beat up by the rock slides:




Our smaller ship docked in a farther away and safer area.

PikeMasters had a small module layout, the Division switching puzzle and examples of cars and modelling. TECO had an information table and made many more people aware the model railroad community in Colorado Springs.

Mark and Amber asked for confirmation of intent to attend the Division trip to the Leadville train on July 9th so they could procure tickets. They hope to arrange carpools for the group to travel over. The ride begins at 10 AM. The coach price for the ride is \$57.

Elizabeth also discussed the November 2-3 TECO show. She is seeking volunteers to help with the event.

After a 15-minute refreshment break, August Bont gave a presentation on the operations of the Rocky Mountaineer in Canada and Colorado. They provide daylight only service on their routes with no sleeping accommodation on board. He noted the different cars in service in the respective routes. Each passenger car will seat up to 56 customers and has its own kitchen and observation platform. The trains average 30 miles per hour for a leisurely trip. The Canadian cars are 3 inches too high to be allowed through the Moffat Tunnel. He also outlined the itinerary for the October trip.



The latest version of the SB24-184 bill was passed by the state's House Transportation, Housing & Local Government Committee in an 8-3 vote and would introduce a congestion impact fee on rental cars to fund the matched investment needed at a local level to access federal funds such as those funded by the bipartisan infrastructure law.

Ron is taking orders for any Micro-Trains items you may need. Ron is giving a 20% discount to members.


Roy is going out of business and closing his store. Roy is giving a 30% discount on all items in the store till they are gone.

Lighter Rail

Midland Railroad Travels Up Ute Pass—A Look at Yesteryear

2000 tourists visited Green Mountain Falls on July 4, 1890!

The Midland Railroad promoted tourist trips to the mountain communities of Cascade, Chipeta Park, Green Mountain Falls and Crystola with the hotels in the area sending wagons to pick up their luggage. The mountain air, pine forests and abundance of nature led visitors to a mountain getaway where tourists could hike, participate in baseball games, and hold boat races in the lake at Green Mountain Falls. As the Midland pushed westward from Colorado City developers pushed westward up Ute Pass to build summer playgrounds.

The first settlers of Cascade were mainly ranchers and a few health seekers. Three sisters from New York homesteaded most of Cascade Canyon, and the eldest, Eliza Marriott Hewlett built the Eastholme Hotel in 1885.

It is interesting to note that although I could find no link that Eliza was a part of the Mariott Hotel chain family, nor how she came to Colorado, her father, William Marriott (1857–1943), was an engineer, locomotive superintendent, and traffic manager of the Midland & Great Northern Joint Railway (M&GN) in South Lincolnshire and North Norfolk, England. Often called the "Father of the M&GN," William Marriott played a crucial role in building and running the railway for 40 years. It acquired notoriety as "Mariott's Tramway."

The formation of Cascade, CO was driven by D. N. Heizer who was the mayor of Colorado Springs and an agent for the Santa Fe Railroad. The Cascade Town Company opened the Cascade Canyon House in 1887. The Ramona Hotel opened two years later in 1889 and became the town's main attraction. The hotel was named after Helen Hunt Jackson who wrote *Ramona*. She was an American poet and writer who championed improved treatment of Native Americans by the United States government.

Chipita Park, then known as Ute Park, was homesteaded by Joe Sales and early ranchers William Wellington and Nathen Culver. The Ute Park Land and Water company, formed in 1890, and built the Ute Hotel. The small and elegant hotel overlooked a man-made lake. In 1927 Frank Marcroft became head of the land company and changed the name of the town to Chipita Park. He built a lodge and a nine-hole golf course.

Green Mountain Falls was first ranchland. An English real-estate agent from Colorado Springs, W. J. Foster, purchased the land in 1887 and created a town company and built a four-acre lake in 1888. The Green Mountain Falls Hotel opened in 1889 overlooking the lake. The Midland Railroad brought thousands of visitors for band concerts, balloon ascensions, and Saturday night dances.

The few residents of Crystola led routine lives until Henry Clay Childs, the Speaker of the Illinois House of Representatives, believed there was gold on his land. The spiritualist, who consulted a crystal ball and held seances in his home, was swayed by a visiting medium to form a mining and milling company in 1899 and issue stock. The medium convinced him an "accommodating wizard" would find the gold. Although a large mill was built, Childs died in 1909 without ever finding gold.


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
